

PORTLAND, OR (June 25, 2024) — Debut author **Brianna** Wheeler celebrates the release of the second edition of her memoir, *Altogether Different* (Korza Books). This expanded edition includes a book club and classroom discussion guide and an interview with the author. Wheeler is interviewed by Ryan Ritchie, a writer and educator who taught *Altogether Different* in his Creative Nonfiction class at El Camino Community College, and touches on the questions and observations that came up in classroom discussions.

Written during the racial reckoning of 2020, *Altogether Different* is a hybrid work of historical non-fiction, personal memoir, and diary illustration. This examination of biracial identity, inheritance, and ancestral duty reflects Wheeler's own narrative against the life story of her most esteemed ancestor, Dangerfield Newby. Newby was the first of John Brown's raiders to die during the raid on Harpers Ferry, the historic battle that preceded the American Civil War.

Additional themes in *Altogether Different* include motherhood, sisterhood, death and grief, LGBTQ parenting, autism

advocacy, cannabis advocacy, generational trauma, civil unrest, and migration from enslaved Virginia to free Ohio.

When Brianna Wheeler was a child, she rejected her grandmother's birthday gift of a Black Barbie, and in doing so, rejected her own biracial identity. After her grandmother's death more than 30 years later, Wheeler inherited shares of a family trust and her family matriarch's extensive genealogy research. While Wheeler organized her grandmother's work, other inheritors fought amongst themselves to fortify their own inheritances. Brianna Wheeler braids her grandmother's research into a timeline that travels between the battles that preceded the civil war, and her own family's battles with legacy, entitlement, and heritage.

Told through a decidedly Black, interracial, femme voice, *Altogether Different* untangles the complex connection between the stories we tell ourselves and the histories preserved for us.

Brianna Wheeler is an essayist, illustrator, and features writer in Portland, Oregon. In addition to writing the cannabis column for the Pulitzer Prize winning Willamette Week, she is also a frequent contributor to Portland City Cast, an author for Weedmaps News, and locally celebrated live speaker/storyteller.
